To develop key skills

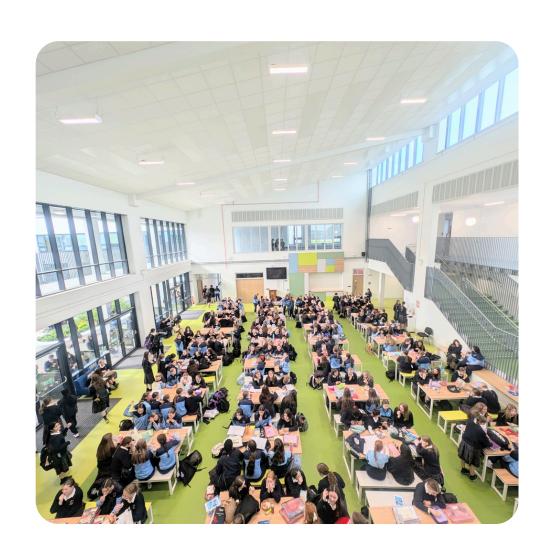
The Junior Cycle focuses on eight key skills which students are given the opportunity to develop by engaging in a wide range of learning experiences.

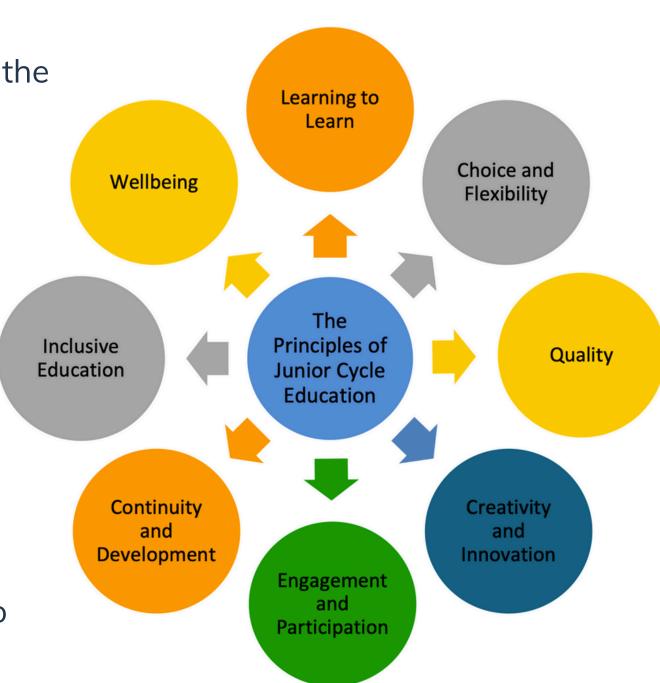


8 Principles

These principles inform the planning for and the development of the Junior Cycle at Presentation.

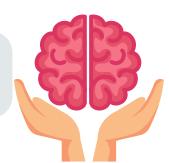
Key Messages:

Uses appropriate technologies in meeting a design challenge



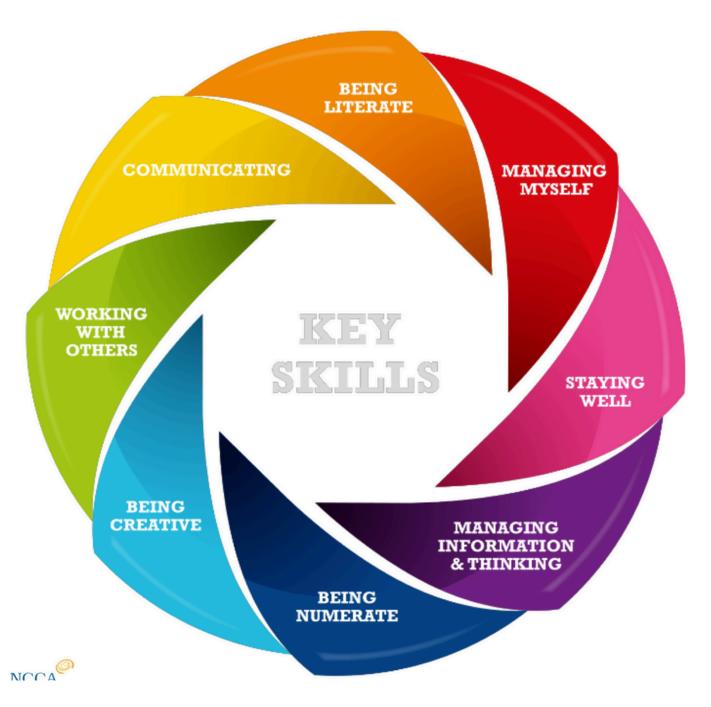

The Structure of the Junior Cycle at Presentation

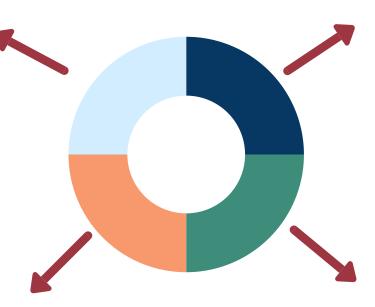






Short Courses

Subjects

Subjects will have a combination of Classroom Based Assessments and an official state exam, except for Religion. Students will have 10 subjects in total. **5 Core Subjects:** Maths, English, Irish, History, Religion (No

final exam)

5 Option Subjects: Business Studies, Applied Technology, Visual Art, Spanish, French, Geography, Science, Graphics, Home Economics, Music



Wellbeing

400 hours of wellbeing will be delivered to our students over their 3 years at Presentation through short courses and their experiences of our policies here at the school.



Other Areas Of Learning

Recognises the skills developed by students in school beyond subjects & short courses, but rather within the school community as a whole.

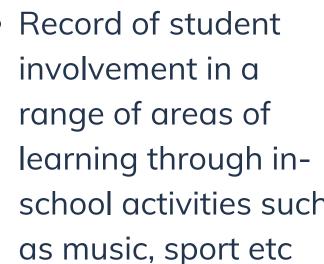

Focus on CBA's (Classroom Based Assessments)

- CBA's provide students with opportunities to demonstrate their understanding and skills in a way which would not be possible in a formal examination.
- CBA's take place in the classroom over a number of weeks, depending on the subject
- The tasks cover a broad range of activities including oral presentations, written work of different types, practical or designing and making activities, artistic performances, scientific experiments, projects or other suitable tasks.
- CBA's facilitate developmental feedback to be given to students. They can review this feedback and identify what they have done well and where they can improve.

CBA's (Classroom Based Assessments)

Some Subject Specific CBA Examples:

Business Studies CBA 1

Students work in groups to come up with a marketing mix for a new product



Students investigate a mathematical problem of their choice. For example, students choose to investigate the cost of a bedroom makeover using as much Maths as possible in their investigation.



Students produce an individual project entitled "The Past in my Place" where they research a place in their local area or county of historical significance.

Rather than a percentage, the following descriptors will be used to identify the percentage bracket that the student has achieved:

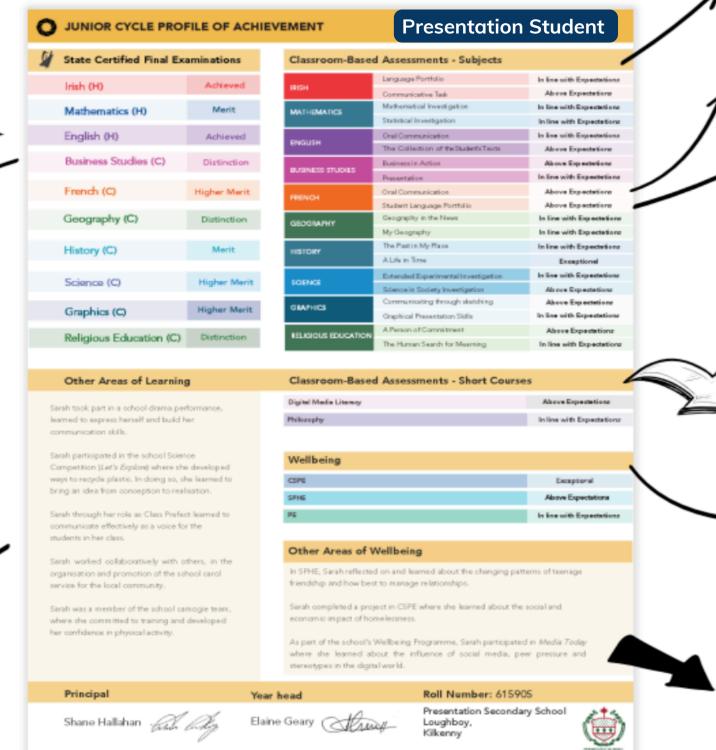
